Résumé

Across Canada, there is a growing momentum around « Community Connections » and « Welcoming Communities » programs and projects. In conjunction with this movement, Citizenship and Immigration Canada is in the process of modernizing its approach to settlement program design and delivery. These phenomena share the drivers of a strong call for horizontal collaboration and the related need to better understand the relevance and potential of place-based approaches. In addition to enriching the knowledge around « Community Connections » type of projects, this workshop aims to shed some light on the policy-making process by illustrating some of the programme/policy machinery in place. The first part of this workshop will articulate some of these place-based approaches and situate them in broader policy context. The rest of the workshop will be devoted to the presentation of « local stories » to illustrate promising « two-way street » place-based practices (in Canada and USA). The workshop will conclude with an open-discussion with the audience.
